#### USA 6, Italy 2 (Semifinal)

"We had 24 minutes of penalties in this game, compared to virtually none for Italy," Burkett said. "We were basically playing shorthanded the entire game and still won fairly easily. But the score was not indicative of how this game would have gone if we wouldn't have been in the penalty box so much."
